COME HOLY SPIRIT

Arriving at a definitive description of the Holy Spirit or how the Holy Spirit works is like trying to herd cats, *its near on impossible!* It would be good to be able to describe it because then we could predict and control it, therefore eliminating any surprises. Sometimes we want to be able to describe precisely what the Holy Spirit does and how it does it because when we can do that, we are in control. The Holy Spirit is much more uncontrollable and unpredictable than that – as Jesus says early in John's Gospel, **“The Spirit blows where it will”**.

While we might not be able to precisely see the Holy Spirit, we can sometimes feel it. A bit like the wind – we can't see it, but we certainly can feel it and be impacted by it. I think that is true of our parish family here on the Sunshine Coast. It is hard to put a finger on it, and it is harder still to describe and define it, but the Holy Spirit is at work in our community.

Ignatius of Laodicea, a Greek Orthodox Patriarch who lived in the fifth century, described the presence and absence of the Holy Spirit in this way:

Without the Holy Spirit, God is distant, Christ is merely a historical figure, the Gospel is a dead letter, the Church is just an organisation, authority is domination, mission is propaganda, liturgy is only nostalgia, and the work of Christians is slave labour.

But with the Holy Spirit, Christ is risen and present, the Gospel is a living force, the Church is a communion in the life of the Trinity, authority is a service that sets people free, mission is Pentecost, the liturgy is memory and anticipation, and the labour of Christians is divinised.

So on this Pentecost, may we be a community of faith with the eyes to see the Holy Spirit at work in our midst. Like the wind, even though we can't see it, this week may we feel the presence of the Holy Spirit, sometimes guiding us, sometimes challenging us, but always pushing us in directions we might not necessarily want to go. Propelled forward with the courage of the Holy Spirit to go there - may we be eloquent and visible witnesses of the Good News along the journey of these next seven days!

For Those Who Are Searching

For cradle, lifelong Catholics, we take so much for granted! On the first and third Sunday of every month, just after the 5:00pm Stella Maris Mass, our Veritas group meets. Veritas is simply Latin for truth. Faith and truth are inseparable! The formal process for that journey is through the RCIA (**R**ite of **C**hristian **I**nitiation for **A**dults). Through this process, over a couple of months, we explore the major building blocks of our faith.

It is meant to be just a chance to explore some of the quirky things we do as Catholics, questions like why the candles, who are those statues, why do we kneel, whats with the Holy Water? – all legitimate questions and questions that lifelong Catholics often take for granted!
