Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice.

These are the words of our Entrance Antiphon for Mass this weekend. It's fitting, then, that we commonly know this Sunday as Gaudete Sunday, or Rejoice Sunday.

We light the rose-coloured candle and don the appropriate vestments to mark this occasion.

Outside of these physical markers, and pink... I mean **rose-coloured** items (because some priests don't like wearing pink), we're told to rejoice. It sounds nice, but what is it that we rejoice about?

Our main task is to rejoice <u>in</u> the Lord. We're told to rejoice, not just on Sundays, or during Mass, but <u>always</u>. The antiphon also has no doubt about our task. We're to rejoice as we ought, not just as a "maybe" or "when you feel like it," but **Rejoice**, here, is an imperative.

Another important question is "why do we rejoice?". We rejoice because, as it says in our first reading, "Courage, do not be afraid. Look, your God is coming... God is coming to save you." Hopefully, we rejoice because we realise that God has chosen to save us and set us free from negativity, darkness, and damnation. Now that's worth rejoicing!

God has physically come to us in the child Jesus. We look upon the face of God whenever we look at Jesus. Our God loves us enough to "swim out into the rip" and save us. Thank you, Lord, that we are worthy enough of your effort.

Rejoicing is the most appropriate response to God's goodness.

But what does that look like? Do we have to walk around with a smile all the time? Are we meant to be happy -go-lucky Christians?

Thankfully, rejoicing in the Lord is more than just an insincere smile. It's "doing the things that you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, and the God of peace will be with you (Phil 4:9)." We're encouraged to strive for a Christian life even in the midst of the ups and downs of this world.

Life will continue to bruise and batter us; but our peace, comfort, and joy will come from Christ. In this, the third week of Advent, we are called to persevere. The Lord's coming is soon. Through our lives, may we actively rejoice in the Lord, that by our actions God may be present again in the world living deeply and truly through us.

We have already passed the halfway mark on our journey towards the birth of the Christ Child! *How time flies!* During our Advent journey, to highlight the significance of this important, compact liturgical season, we have done a couple of things differently. Obviously the change in liturgical colours to purple and the lighting of the Advent Wreath at the start of Mass sets the scene. But also, our deliberate pausing and use of silence at the start of Mass and after the readings hopefully gives us a chance to reflect in the midst of the busyness of this time of the year. The scripture for the next two weeks shifts from the focus on the end times to the joy of anticipation at the approach of the nativity. To emphasise this the recessional hymn for the 3rd and 4th weekends of Advent will be "Wait for the Lord".

Prepare the Way

Reconciliation should be part of everyone's journey towards the birth of the Christ Child. This Advent there are two opportunities to celebrate God's mercy and forgiveness.

On Saturday morning, <u>17 December at 9.00am</u> at Our Lady of the Rosary, Caloundra we will have the opportunity to celebrate a **Communal Rite of Reconciliation**. Then on Monday,

19 December at 5.00pm at Stella Maris Church, there will also be a Communal Rite of Reconciliation and everyone is invited to attend. Please tell your Catholic neighbours and friends! (Please note that because your priests will be assisting at the Rite of Reconciliation at Caloundra on Saturday 17 December, there will be no confessions at Stella Maris Church that morning).


Thank you for remembering your parish in your will.

During the season of Advent, we await the celebration of Christ's birth and His coming again at the end of time. Over four weeks, we prepare our hearts and our lives for Christmas in penitential reflection. But in the middle of the season, Gaudete Sunday calls us to rejoice in hope! Gaudete simply means "rejoice" in Latin and is pronounced in three syllables: *Gow-day* -tay. One of the candles on our Advent Wreath is rose or pink. We light it today, the third Sunday in Advent, to represent joy and the anticipation of Christmas.

The season of Advent developed in the Church over time. Here are 10 facts that you may not know about the roots and meanings of Advent:

- 1. Advent is a time of expectation and preparation for the birth of the Lord. The word "Advent" derives from the Latin word "adventus," which means "coming," and is associated with the four weeks of preparation for Christmas.
- 2. Advent has a changing start date, but it always contains four Sundays. It starts on the Sunday closest to the feast of St. Andrew the Apostle (Nov. 30). It can begin as early as Nov. 27th or as late as Dec. 3.
- 3. Advent marks the beginning of the liturgical year. Advent was chosen to begin the year as representative of the time in history that Christ was not known to us. With His birth the beginning of our faith was founded. The liturgical year ends with the feast of Christ the King, His reign over the universe.
- 4. The Advent season has two meanings. It emphasizes both the celebration of Christ coming into the world as a man and also the Second Coming when the Lord will return again. It blends together a penitential spirit, very similar to Lent, a liturgical theme of preparation for the Second and Final Coming of the Lord, called the Parousia, and a joyful theme of getting ready for the Bethlehem event. The traditional colour of Advent is purple or violet, which symbolizes the penitential spirit. Religious traditions associated with Advent express all these themes.
- 5. Hope is a predominant theme of Advent. The Israelites hoped for a Messiah to come, and Christ entered the world. We are hopeful for the arrival of Christ again into the world.
- 6. Advent is a reminder of the Old Testament promises of the coming of the Messiah. The Advent tradition of the Jesse Tree consists of symbols of the Messiah coming from the line of Jesse (Lk 3: 23-38). Isaiah is often read during this season to remember that we are waiting for the day when the Messiah will come again.
- 7. Advent focuses on light as opposed to darkness. Christ enters our dark world and casts away the darkness of sin to redeem us. He will come again as the light of the world.
- 8. Advent has two parts. The first portion, the First Sunday of Advent until December 16, is preparation for the Second Coming of Christ. The second portion, from December 17 to 24, directly prepares us for the commemoration of the first coming of Christ, Christmas.
- 9. The origins of Advent can be traced back to the Church in France. In the 4th Century, the Church in France used the period before Epiphany as a time of preparation for baptism.
- 10. Advent as we know today was developed in Rome. Pope Gregory I in the late 6th or early 7th Century composed many of the prayers, antiphons and psalm responses. Many themes and ideas we now know can be traced to the Roman Advent season.
