THERE ARE NONE SO BLIND.....

I hate having to wear glasses! Every year my eyesight seems to be deteriorating a little more! I am painfully reminded of my visual limitations when I go to the supermarket without glasses and I can't see prices or the ingredients or directions on labels. I look back fondly on a time when I could see everything clearly. Perhaps because of vanity or just the unrelenting process of growing old, but as my sight slowly deteriorates, I wonder if I really appreciate what I am missing out on?

This week's Gospel is the story of the man born blind. For the second weekend in a row we get a rather long Gospel and yet, for such a long story, the amazing thing is that Jesus only appears at the beginning and at the end. In fact, at the end of the story Jesus hears that the blind man had been driven away and he goes looking for him. We sometimes miss the significance of Jesus hearing about what had happened to the man and deliberately setting out to find him. You see, it is not a question of whether we, sighted or blind, find Jesus. Rather it is an image of Jesus coming to look for us and finding us where we are.

As for the story itself, there is a rich vein of irony running through it. We can see how God turns the world's expectations on it's head. The reality of things is just the opposite of what it seems to be. Those who are so sure they can see are, in truth, blind. He who starts out blind takes a risk at Jesus' invitation and ends up seeing. The once blind man passes from blindness to sight to insight. He stands in contrast to the neighbours, who remain in ignorance; his parents, who refuse to take a risk; and the authorities and Pharisees, who refuse to believe what their eyes see. It seems it is true that there is no one as blind as the person who refuses to see.

There's a line from the Talmud, which is a commentary on the Scriptures used by the rabbis, which reads, "We do not see things as they are – we see them as we are." For me personally the point of the story is that one day, a man who was blind from birth was touched by the Light and he, himself, became a light and he touched others with his light and they, in turn, became light to others.

Could it be true that this story could resemble our life story, a tale of our daily struggle to overcome our darkness with light? With our determination and God's grace anything is possible. Sure there is a risk involved but we all long to be able to say "while I might not know all the answers one thing I do know is that once I was blind but now I see".

Wishing you vision and insight for the week ahead.

Ministry to the Sick, the Hospitalised and the Housebound

As we move beyond Covid and try to re-establish the normal routine of our Parish life over the next couple of weeks we will be concentrating on our ministry to the sick, the hospitalised and the housebound. Each week Holy Communion is taken from our Masses to those who cannot be with us to celebrate the Eucharist – this is an important ministry and we are grateful to all the Communion Ministers who are part of this ministry. Over the next couple of weeks we will host several short meetings with ministers to confirm that we are following best practice in our ministry and to ensure that there are no gaps in our ministry to the sick and housebound.

<u>The first meeting</u> is on next Saturday, March 25 at 9.30am at the Parish Office and it is for all parishioners who would like to be on a roster and <u>bring Holy Communion to the patients of Buderim Private Hospital</u>.

The next meeting will be on Saturday, April 22 at 9.30am at the Parish Office. It will be an initial enquiry meeting for parishioners who would like to be part of the <u>pastoral care ministry</u> at the Buderim Private Hospital. This is different from bringing Holy Communion to patients but rather is focused on the spiritual wellbeing of all patients at the hospital. A formation programme, offered by the hospital, is part of the preparation for this ministry.

<u>The final meeting</u> is on Saturday April 29 at 9.30am, at the Parish Office, and is for all parishioners who take Holy Communion to the housebound and to aged care facilities. It is an opportunity for our Parish to ensure that all aged care facilities are being visited, that best practice is being followed and all safeguarding protocols are in place.

At this stage of the term, there's a buzz around the school as parents and for teachers meet end-of-term interviews to discuss student progress, achievements and learning goals. They might review data, share stories from different perspectives, look at student work samples and enlighten each other about a child's learning journey so far this year. Genuine partnerships between home and school have been proven to have a positive impact on student engagement and we really appreciate the effort everyone puts in to help every child to flourish.

On the learning front, our Prep students have had such a full term, adapting to "big school", making new friends, learning new routines, exploring new concepts and building lots of skills. In Religious Education lessons, the children have been investigating what life must have been like for Jesus, growing up in a Jewish family. They have been comparing their own families, clothes, games, homes and celebrations with those of Jesus' time. They had lots of fun working with their Year 6 buddies to design and create replicas of homes in Nazareth, two thousand years ago. They are now learning about the story of Holy Week and the first Easter Sunday by collecting symbols to help them retell the story. No wonder their smiles are so big!

Week 7 of the term was rounded out with a group of Year 12s again volunteering at the Friday Night Community Meal at Stella Maris; the Open Rugby boys participating in a pre-season weekend training camp; and a group of students, teachers and parents staffing one of the drink stations at the Mooloolaba Triathlon.

We have just completed Week 8 and it was another busy one! Our Year 7 and 9 students engaged with the two-day NAPLAN testing, which is designed to show how, at this point-in-time, they are progressing in Literacy and Numeracy. In addition, our Year 10s had the opportunity to participate in the St Catherine's Mass on Wednesday. In his homily, Fr Will reflected on the rules which guide us, and challenged the students to 'find who they are in Christ'.

Thursday was Close the Gap Day, and all members of the community were encouraged to consider what actions need to be taken to raise the standard of living for Indigenous people - so that we can close the gap in healthcare and access to health resources.
