Our Parish has zero tolerance for all forms of abuse and is committed to safeguarding everyone involved in its activities, ministries and services. The safety and wellbeing of children and adults-at-risk is paramount.

The Gospel for this Sunday is brief in comparison with those of the past few weeks. The soothing, reassuring image of the Good Shepherd is easy for us to picture. We are the cute, cuddly, frisky sheep; and Jesus is the strong and caring shepherd who keeps us from harm. The key to this image is that the sheep listen. *The sheep hear his voice, one by one he calls his own sheep and leads them out... the sheep follow because they know his voice.*

I don't know about you, but my world is full of voices and noise and sounds that easily distract and confuse. How do I hear the voice of the Good Shepherd amid, and in spite of, all the other noises? That is the great challenge of being a disciple, being part of the flock that is called Stella Maris Parish.

For a Christian, prayer is the most obvious way in which we listen to God. However, sometimes we make the mistake of thinking that if we don't pray then God is not present. We don't pray to make God present to us. God is already present. We pray to make ourselves present to God. God, as the English writer Sheila Cassidy colourfully puts it, is no more present in church than in a drinking bar, but we generally are more present to God in church than we are in a drinking bar. The problem of presence is not with God, but with us.

But if we seriously want to make ourselves present to God then we will need discipline, focus and determination. Like gaining anything worthwhile in life, *there are no shortcuts*!

The first step is to discern the sound of the Good Shepherd, to be able to identify his voice in the midst of so many distractions. To have any chance of this happening this week requires us consciously setting aside some time for prayer. If we are disciplined enough to begin each day in silence, or take advantage of morning Mass, or are creative and structure some time during the day where we can pray, then we stand a chance of discerning the voice of the shepherd and being attentive to his directions. If we don't, then our senses will be overwhelmed with the competing noise and sounds of our modern, secular world.

But, *and this is the bonus*, in making ourselves present to God we run the risk of also becoming attentive to the richness of our own lives! Too often we are not present to the beauty, love, and grace that brim within the ordinary moments of our lives. There is a haziness to our lives that can develop and, if we are not careful, days slip into weeks that quickly become months, and before we know it, yet another year has slipped by. The beauty, richness and uniqueness of our lives is there for us to claim. Unfortunately more often than not, we are too busy or not disciplined enough to be in the same space.

So, if the secret to prayer is not to try to make God present, but to make ourselves present to God, the secret to finding beauty and love in life is basically the same.

To embrace the true joy of this Easter season is to be attentive to the voice of the Good Shepherd. *When he has brought out his flock, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow because they know his voice.* So this week have the discipline, make the time and don't expect the Good Shepherd to carry a megaphone!

The Journey of Faith Continues

To launch our Sacramental Programme for 2023 we invited Jesuit author and theologian, **Fr Richard Leonard** to speak to the parents of children preparing to make their Confirmation. Last Monday evening at Stella Maris, Fr Richard explored the work that the Australian Church does today because it is important that, as parents, they know what their children are being Confirmed into. Fr Richard then reflected upon the Gifts of the Holy Spirit and how, in practical ways, they impact the choices we make day in, day out. Finally, Fr Richard challenged us, as parents and parishioners, to be open to the Holy Spirit in our lives, allowing the Spirit to guide our actions and trusting enough to make the sometimes scary choices that we are called to make because of our faith.

Moving forward for all those who attended the above Parent Information Night, on the weekend of May 13th/14th across our parish there will be **Enrolment Masses** for our Confirmation candidates whereby we will officially acknowledge them as candidates for the Sacrament of Confirmation.

On Monday evening, June 5th at Stella Maris the <u>final parent</u> and candidate preparation session will take place which law evening Mass

will include a rehearsal – please note there will be no Monday evening Mass.

On Thursday evening, June 8th, at Stella Maris we will celebrate the <u>Sacrament of Confirmation</u>.

As our young candidates and their families journey towards celebrating the Sacrament of Confirmation we pray that the Holy Spirit will guide them and that we might be a Parish Family that visibly reflects the Holy Spirit at work in our lives in the example we give and in the choices we make.



Priority Two:

Reshaping Parish Communities

"Our current structures are based upon the facts of an earlier time and our current

mode of provision is unsustainable. In the cities at least we have too many parishes and too many churches. Urban parishes were established on the assumption that people had to be able to walk to church and at a time when the numbers attending Mass were much larger. Many of our parishes are pressed financially and cannot provide the range of services which a missionary Church requires. Therefore, we need – sensibly and over time – to move towards larger configurations of a community of communities where the concentration of personnel and the sharing of resources would allow a greater range of services for the sake of the Gospel." Many thanks to all those who donated to our venture including family businesses, school families, children, staff and parishioners.


We are so truly humbled by the response from our Siena Primary family **raising over \$11,000** for the most vulnerable. WOW!

There is no doubt that if our original ANZACs could have seen the engagement of the Stella Maris Primary Catholic School community their hearts would have swelled with pride. The spirit of those ANZACs continues to touch hearts and impact the lives of even the littlest Australians, over a vears hundred after the first ANZACs arrived at the shores of Gallipoli.

Our formal acknowledgement of ANZAC Day began with a whole school prayer assembly. While our Year 6 students led us in prayer and reflection, Mr Ballam spoke about how we can honour the legacy of the ANZACs today. Our Stella Fellas choir performed a soul-stirring rendition of The Last ANZAC before each class placed a wreath in our sacred space. Mrs McNamara (a current staff member and past member of the Royal Australian Navy) recited The Ode and then you could have heard a pin drop during the playing of the Last Post, the minute silence and the Reveille. After a spirited singing of the National Anthem, we all followed the procession of wreaths to where they were displayed on our Path of Remembrance.

And then on ANZAC Day itself, a record number of over 200 students and staff represented the school in the march from the Maroochydore RSL and following service.
