## **TRANSFIGURATION**

How often do we recognise the face of Jesus in our daily lives? How often does Jesus need to make himself blatantly obvious to us, before we recognise the glory and magnificence of who God is?

The Transfiguration of Jesus was a special moment, in fact the only moment where Jesus reveals His true glorious and divine self was to the three chosen disciples. Can you imagine what a wonderful experience it must have been for Peter, James and John to see Jesus transfigured. They got a preview of the glory of Jesus, and His glory in Heaven. It was also a preview of the glory we all hope to share in Heaven one day. While the three disciples were aware that something extraordinary was happening before their eyes, they failed to capture the full extent of what was going on. This is clear in Peter's statement "let us make three tents". Like Peter, we can sometimes be locked in our own particular situation and lose sight of the fact that we are part of a much bigger picture.

Jesus chose to reveal Himself at a time when He and His chosen disciples were alone and away from the busyness of society. He chose a quiet time of prayer to reveal His true self in all His Glory. Like the disciples, we need to set time apart, to be with our Lord and allow Him to reveal Himself to us.

The Transfiguration not only gives us a passing glimpse of Jesus in all His glory, but it is a taste of what is to come. Although we may never experience something as powerful as the three disciples did, every day, in countless ways, God's dazzling presence can break into our lives. Each of our own Christ-like acts, and our moments of turning to God, are moments of "Transfiguration". We may also experience transfiguration in moments of interaction with others, where people reach out to us with unexpected words or gestures of kindness. Jesus reveals His glory to us through these moments.

Let us ask God to give us the eyes to see Him and recognise His glorious face in our lives.

## SAFEGUARDING CHILDREN AND VULNERABLE ADULTS

## Prevention and Protection Policy Statement

... for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. Mark 10:14

Children, young people and vulnerable adults are a gift from God with an intrinsic right to dignity of life, respect and security from physical and emotional harm. They are to be treasured, nurtured and safeguarded.

This means that everyone in the Church must ensure that the fundamental rights of children, young adults and vulnerable adults are respected. This will be achieved through the development of respectful relationships and a commitment to safety embracing appropriate boundaries, behaviours and practices, in accordance with the Archdiocese of Brisbane *Code of Ethical Behaviour for employees and volunteers who work in service of the Church* as well as adherence to the legislative imperatives of the State.

### **CATECHESIS CORNER**

Following on from our last instalment of 'Catechesis Corner' we spoke about *who* could baptise? One of the results of Baptism is the forgiveness of Original Sin, but what is Original Sin?

#### <u>Original Sin</u>

This teaching seems to divide Catholics down the middle. Those who profess it believe that it's essential to Jesus' saving mission. Those who reject it might say it's not fair for God to punish us for something we didn't do. It undeniably begins with Adam and Eve's disobedience. They lose the grace of original holiness (CCC#399). There's no evidence to say that Adam's guilt or fault for this sin has been handed onto us - that is not the meaning of Original Sin, but rather, Original Sin is the first moral choice of wrongdoing by Adam and Eve whereby sin and its consequences came into the human race. Those consequences are destruction and death.

The catechism makes an important distinction. It says that Original Sin is called sin "only in an analogical sense: it is a sin 'contracted' and not 'committed' - a state and not an act (CCC#404)." So we take no fault for what happened in the garden, but there's no way of getting around the consequences of sin and how it's affected our world. This part is why it's essential that we have the Sacraments as a way of helping us beyond these consequences. We're not protected from the consequences but we're equipped to face them.
